TRAINING

Training occurs at the beginning of every semester.

The student volunteers are taught how to take patient vitals such as: blood pressure, pulse rate, and respiratory rate, as well as history taking. They are also trained to obtain glucose levels, perform cardiovascular and respiratory examinations.



1 Vitals

The qualified volunteers will be taking blood pressure readings, heart rate, respiratory rate, anthropometric measurements like height, weight and BMI and performing basic systemic examinations.

2 Blood glucose

Obtaining blood glucose is very important because of the high diabeticic rate in the community. Volunteers are therefore trained to take the blood glucose of the patients.

Patient to physician relationship

The **qualified** volunteers (i.e. those who pass the oral exam at the end of the training) are given an opportunity to interact with real patients in the real world and thus receive hands-on training that will build confidence in patient-doctor.

4 CERTIFICATION

Every volunteer receives a certificate at the end of the semester for their honorable service in the community.

- Every volunteer is required to take a practical exam at the end of the training session.
 Students must pass the exam in order to voluteer with SFH.
- SFH provides its services to at least five sites per semester. However, in order to achieve a certificate, a student must be attending at least three sites and a total of 12 community service hours.
- Students must obtain a personal stethoscope and BP cuff before the first outreach site.
